The City of Los Angeles Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA) is pleased to award the City of Los Angeles (C.O.L.A.) Individual Artist Fellowships to fifteen local artists. The professional and artistic caliber of these 15 Fellows is the reason why C.O.L.A. has been nationally recognized as one of the most prestigious municipal arts funding programs in the country. Los Angeles is one of a handful of municipalities that offers individual artists grants on a national level. Since 1990, the Department of Cultural Affairs has awarded over \$47 million dollars to local artists, arts organizations, and arts events.

Of the fifteen C.O.L.A. 2008 Fellows, nine are visual artists: Judie Bamber, Erin Cosgrove, Joyce Dallal, Lewis Klahr, Suzanne Lacy, Timothy Nolan, Stas Orlovski, Louise Sandhaus and Alex Slade. The four performing artists are Adelina Anthony, Phranc Gottlieb, John Malpede, and David Rousseve. The two literary artists are Sesshu Foster and Tara Ison.

Every year, DCA presents an exhibition of the C.O.L.A. Fellows' new artworks. The 2008 C.O.LA. Individual Artist Fellowships Exhibition was organized by Mark Steven Greenfield, Curator and Director of Exhibits at DCA's Municipal Art Gallery at Barnsdall Park. The exhibit opens Friday, May 16, and remains on view through Sunday, July 13, 2008. The Exhibition's Opening Reception will be held on Sunday, May 18, from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. In addition, the Municipal Art Gallery will present Conversations with the Artists, a dialogue series with the nine visual arts Fellows. Admission to all the events is free.

The 2008 C.O.L.A. Performances will be held at Grand Performances and include performance art pieces, music, and literary readings. Two different performances will be offered on two days: Friday, June 13 and Saturday, June 14 at 8:30 p.m. Admission is free. DCA's commitment to supporting the local creative economy, while selecting artists who have demonstrated extraordinary talent, is one of the many reasons why the C.O.L.A. Fellowship Program is nationally praised. As Olga Garay, DCA's Executive Director, points out: "Municipal support for solo artists is critically important. Living or working among us, these engaging entrepreneurs symbolize our community's dedication to linking ideas with innovations. Through their work, we are able to claim that Los Angeles is one of the most vibrant creative economies in the world."

The C.O.L.A. Individual Artist Fellowship Program awards each fellow with \$10,000 to create a new body of work that is showcased in a non-thematic group presentation series. Fellows are selected based upon years of artistic excellence. Peer panels include local art experts, educators, and community leaders who review more than 150 competitive applications each year.

Grants are awarded on a competitive basis to bring the highest quality artistic and cultural services to Los Angeles residents and visitors. Joe Smoke, DCA Cultural Grant Program Director, notes that, "The C.O.L.A. Program reinvigorates interest in Los Angeles as a creative place to live, work, or visit."

The Los Angeles Municipal Art Gallery is a facility of the City of Los Angeles Department of Cultural Affairs and is located at 4800 Hollywood Boulevard, Los Angeles, 90027. Admission is free. The Gallery is open Thursdays through Sundays, 12:00 noon to 5:00 p.m. Hours are extended to 9:00 p.m. on First Fridays. For general information, the public may call 323.644.6269.

LA LA LA is All-American Jewish Lesbian Folksinger **Phranc's** wry, thoughtful and downright hilarious new music inspired by our hometown.

Foster's reading from *American Loneliness, the New Work*, will reflect his cultural, biological, literary, and activist DNA and our community's recombinant historical complexity.

Malpede's theatrical presentation, *Cruel, Unusual Outrages Upon Personal Dignity, Punishment And Humiliating Degrading Treatment* inter-cuts public documents with hallucinated writings in an illuminating way.

The New Socrates Wannabe is dancer/choreographer **Rousseve**'s excavation of southern African-American histories.

Physical and spiritual death, personal and historical violence, memory, symbolism and gesture culminate in **Anthony's** theatrical work, *Prey for Me*.
