1. Dubbed by Nelson Mandela as "South Africa's cultural ambassadors to the world," **Ladysmith Black Mambazo** has lifted the hearts of millions with their onstage harmonies and warm sound. Formed by Joseph Shabalala in 1960, and revealed to the world via Paul Simon's 1986 album *Graceland*, the group lauded as a champion for traditional African vocal styling is still going strong after nearly 60 years (though many members have changed), and has earned five Grammys.
