*Mark Cottle: The Cost Of Money* Mark Cottle is fascinated by the plastic bag, the defining symbol of a disposable consumer culture. You purchase something and you get a plastic bag; then you throw it away. Nobody needs them, everyone gets them; trash begets trash. In *The Cost of Money*, Cottle has created three tapestries made of plastic bags and twine, all of which interact with the established space of famed architect Richard Neutra's home and studio.
